Four winning research bids

New study explains reductions in stunting in Bangladesh

A recent cross-country study by LANSA researcher, <u>Derek Headey</u> concluded that from 1997 to 2007 Bangladesh recorded one of the fastest prolonged reductions in child underweight and stunting prevalence in recorded history. In an <u>IFPRI Disscussion Paper</u> funded by LANSA, Derek explains some of the factors behind the reductions.







Farming system for nutrition in India

MSSRF's new farming model to promote improved nutrition outcomes among vulnerable farming communities is featured in Current Science (PDF).
